Earth Day 2001: Events feature prominent environmentalists

April 22 is Earth Day, a day designated to recognize the environmental movement started in 1970. Each year Earth Day is celebrated with events geared toward environmental awareness. Washington State University Vancouver is the site of two such events.

"An Evening with Denis Hayes" hosted by The Fort Vancouver Regional Library District's "Forum at the Library" and WSU Vancouver takes place Friday, April 13 at 7 p.m. in the Student Services Lecture Hall.

A leader in energy conservation, Hayes is a co-founder of Earth Day, chair of the Earth Day Network, president of the Bullitt Foundation and chair of the Energy Foundation's Board of Directors. He is also a graduate of

Camas High School and Clark College.

"Earth Day Symposium on the Environment" takes place Friday, April 20 from noon to 3 p.m. This event features environmental activist Julia Butterfly Hill and is sponsored by the WSU Vancouver and Clark College Environmental Clubs and the Associated Students of WSU Vancouver.

A symposium takes place at noon. A lunch for WSU Vancouver and Clark College students (by ticket only) follows at 1 p.m. and a forum on the environment at 2 p.m. is free and open to all.

The symposium and forum will be held in the Student Services Lecture Hall. Hill will also speak at Earth Night at Clark College the same evening.

CougRF 96.5 FM on air, Internet

There's a new radio station in town for the Cougar community. CougRF 96.5 FM is a student-run radio station broadcast on campus via a .10-watt receiver and to the world via the Internet. "Coug" is short for Cougar, the WSU mascot, and "RF" stands for radio frequency.

The .10 of a watt receiver currently in use allows CougRF airwaves to reach

on campus only. Webcasting via Nibblebox.com allows the station to reach the outer community and world.

Hansen is a Vancouver resident whose works are inspired by her travels in Europe and lend themselves to an Impressionistic style of painting.

'Women Who Weld'

On display in the WSU Vancouver library are welded metal sculptures by "Women Who Weld," a local group of women passionate about welded art. These works will be on display until April 27.

- Any exceptions to the above require approval from the Campus Executive Officer and Dean.

The "Women Who Weld" exhibit is open during library hours: Monday-Thursday, 8 a.m. to 9:30 p.m.; Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.; and Saturday and Sunday, noon to 5 p.m.
