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## Introduction

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## Part 1 - Student Headcount

WSU Vancouver Fall Campus Headcount


Figure 1| Fall campus headcount increased from 2329 to 3585 between 2006 and 2019. The past three years have seen enrollment declines, resulting in a fall headcount of 2833 in Fall 2022.


Figure $2 \mid$ AAFTE has increased from 827 to 2736 between the $97-98$ and 22-23 school years. The figure Includes only state-funded AAFTE. Both headcount and AAFTE declined this year.

Figure 6 | Fall Freshman application numbers reached an all-time high for the fall 2022 term. Fall transfer applications have reached their peek of 1318 in 2017 and declined to 758 in 2020.


Figure $\mathbf{7 |}$ | After declining for several years, the percentage of applicants offered admission increased in Fall 2020. This resulted from a higher percentage of complete applications, due to the cessation of the SAT/ACT exam requirement.

Figure 8 | From 2006 to 2022, the percentage of fall freshmen identifying as students of color increased from 16\% to 47\%. (2022 Percentages for individual race/ethnicity groups: Asian American 10\%, Black/African American 2\%, American Indian/Alaska Native $<1 \%$, Hispanic/Latino $28 \%$, Native Hawaiian or Pacific Island $1 \%$, Two or more Races $5 \%$, White $50 \%$, Not Reported 3\%, International <1\%.) The percentage of freshman women has stayed near 55\% over the past decade. New students depicted are Summer/Fall admits only and correspond to census day enrollment.

(2022 Percentages for individual race/ethnicity groups: Asian American 10\%, Black/African American 3\%, American Indian/Alaska Native 1\%, Hispanic/Latino 13\%, Native Hawaiian or Pacific Island <1\%, Two or more Races $8 \%$, White $60 \%$, Not Reported 3\%, International 2\%.) The percentage of freshman women dropped from $67 \%$ in 2002 to $53 \%$ in 2022. New students depicted are Summer/Fall admits only and correspond to census day enrollment.

Figure $\mathbf{1 1}$ | After reaching an all-time low for the entering class of 2020, First-time full-time freshman retention rebounded for the entering class of 2021. Further gains are reflected in the Fall-to-Spring retention for the entering class of 2022. Small classes are vulnerable to fluctuations. First-time full-time freshman data are used as a benchmark to compare across universities. This population makes up a small percentage of WSU Vancouver's students. Figure 15| ${ }^{\text {st }}$ year retention is correlated with previous GPA for both transfer students and those admitted as freshmen. This relationship is especially strong for freshman admits. In recent years, attrition for students from the lowest high school GPA quartile was roughly three times that of their than peers from the highest quartile.

However, graduation rates for transfer students during the same period were showed a $5 \%$ disparity in the opposite direction.

Figure $\mathbf{1 7}$ | Graduation rate disparities between female students and male students averaged $3 \%$ for transfer students. However, graduation rates for students admitted as freshmen during the same period were similar between the two groups.
